• WHAT ARE THOSE !! ??

This is an oft presented query when at the pool. If there, anyone looking out over lake # 17 towards the SSW is baffled by the white structures they see. These are Purple Martin nesting cavities. The Purple Matin is a Native American specie that is declining in number. A few other interesting facts about this amazing bird are: 1. They fly 5,000 + or - miles to have their young here, in N. Am., from Brazil to Florida and others fly all the way up into Canada, ,2. They get their name from the male bird but he is not actually purple, the sunshine on him gives him a purplish sheen, but he is glossy black, 3. They are the largest swallow in N. Am., 4. The females are lighter and more drab in color, these girls have a lighter brownish breast and more of a brown back, 5. They rely almost exclusively on man made and man provided cavities in which they will propagate , i.e. the plastic gourds you see, 6. Once a clutch is established which is usually 1 to 7 eggs, avg.5 the female will begin to incubate, 16 days later the babies are hatched and will be fed for 26 to 28 days by the parents in the nest, then it is time to fledge, most will be long gone by the middle of June. They will roost up for a few weeks then fly back to Brazil. 7. They feed almost exclusively on flying insects, it is like having a really cool pet that you do not have to feed ! 8. For more info on the Martins, google, Purple Martin, or go to the PMCA, Purple Martin Conservation Association website, a non profit association dedicated solely to the scientific study of the Martin and to educating people about this bird and its benefits and what they can do to help. Oh !! did I mention they eat fire ants!!!! ? When fire ants wish to relocate they like the bees create another queen and winged ants to accompany her on her new location flight, the purple martins feast on these ants while in the air.

Any one interested in seeing the Martins up close can go to 436 Pendleton Drive, walk around back and sit on Neil and Pat's back Patio, they are snow birds and will be gone by the time this article airs in the Voice, but bring a chair, binoculars and a camera, now thru middle May is a busy time as the parents are very busy feeding the very hungry babies, 9-10 AM is the best time, but anytime of the day is quite good, all are welcome!!
